We collect and prepare clothing for relief, local or overseas.

At Christmas time we send cheer boxes to shut-ins.

We recognize birthdays with a cake and appropriate ceremonies.

We thank all who have helped in the past, and ask cooperation in the future.

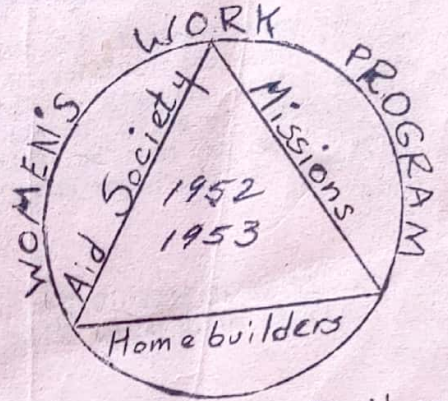

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF WOMEN'S WORK--Amend Article IV, Officers to read "a secretary, a treasurer" in place of "The officers of the Women's Work organization shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary, a treasurer, a director of Aid, a director of Homebuilders, a director of Lessons, together with the chairman of any other regular departments or major committees. These officers constitute the Cabinet of Women's Work".

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS OF WOMEN'S WORK--The duties of the secretary-treasurer listed under Section 3 will be separated into Section 3 and Section 4. The section concerning program directors, currently called Section 7 will be called Section 5. The amended Section 3 would read "Section 3. Secretary. The secretary shall conduct all correspondence of the cabinet, keep a record of all meetings." The amended Section 4 would read "Section 4. Treasurer. The treasurer shall receive and disburse funds at the discretion of the cabinet. The books will be audited at the end of the year by either the church auditing committee or a committee appointed by the president. The treasurer also sends the annual report blank and funds to the district treasurer as authorized by the group."

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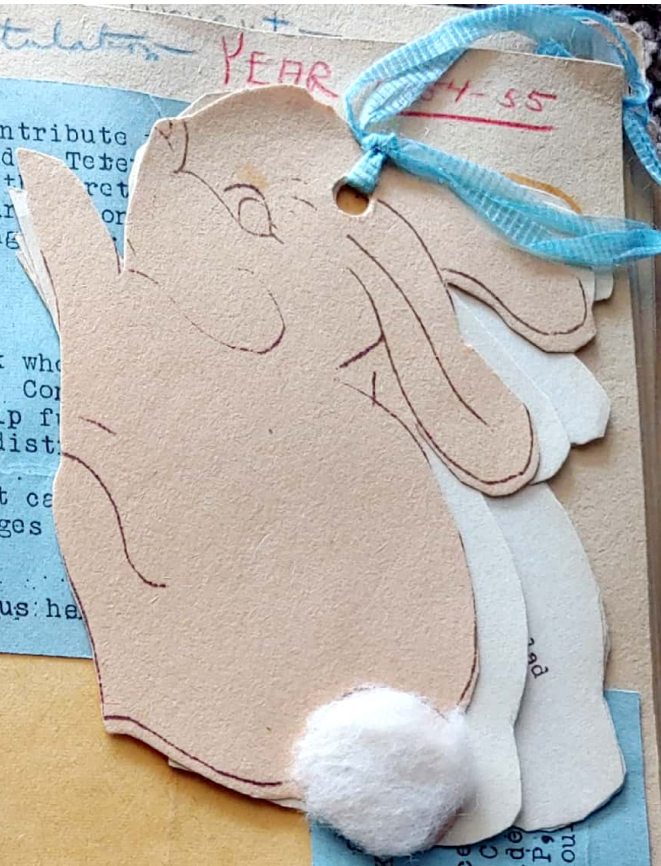
CHEER BOXES

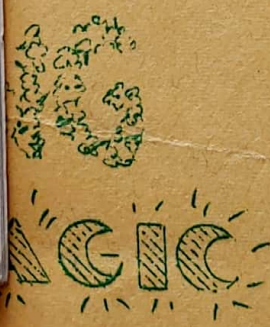


WOMEN'S WORK YEARBOOK 1954-1955

## HOMEBUILDERS CIRCLE MEETING — OCTOBER

1. Say to yourself, "Worry is just a very bad mental habit. And I can change any habit with God's help."
2. You became a worrier by practicing worry. You can become free of worry by practicing the opposite and stronger habit of faith. With all the strength and perseverance you can command, start practicing faith.
3. How do you practice faith? First thing every morning before you arise say out loud, "I believe," three times.
4. Pray, using this formula, "I place this day, my life, my loved ones, my work in the Lord's hands. There is no harm in the Lord's hands, only good. Whatever happens, whatever results, if I am in the Lord's hands it is the Lord's will and it is good."
5. Practice saying something positive concerning everything about which you have been talking negatively. Talk positively. For example, don't say, "This is going to be a terrible day." Instead, affirm, "This is going to be a glorious day." Don't say, "I'll never be able to do that." Instead, affirm, "With God's help I will do that."
6. Never participate in a worry conversation. Shoot an injection of faith into all your conversations. A group of people talking pessimistically can infect every person in the group with negativism. But by talking things up rather than down you can drive off that depressing atmosphere and make everyone feel hopeful and happy.
7. One reason you are a worrier is that your mind is literally saturated with apprehension thoughts, defeat thoughts, gloomy thoughts. To counteract, mark every passage in the Bible that speaks of faith, hope, happiness, glory, radiance. Commit each to memory. Say them over and over again until these creative thoughts saturate your subconscious mind. Then the subconscious will return to you what you have given it, namely, optimism, not worry.
8. Cultivate friendships with hopeful people. Surround yourself with friends who think positive, faith-producing thoughts and who contribute to a creative atmosphere. This will keep you restimulated with faith attitudes.
9. See how many people you can help to cure their own worry habit. In helping another to overcome worry you get greater power over it within yourself.
10. Every day of your life conceive of yourself as living in partnership and companionship with Jesus Christ. If He actually walked by your side, would you be worried or afraid? Well, then, say to yourself, "He is with me." Affirm aloud, "I am with you always." Then change it to say, "He is with me now." Repeat that affirmation three times every day.

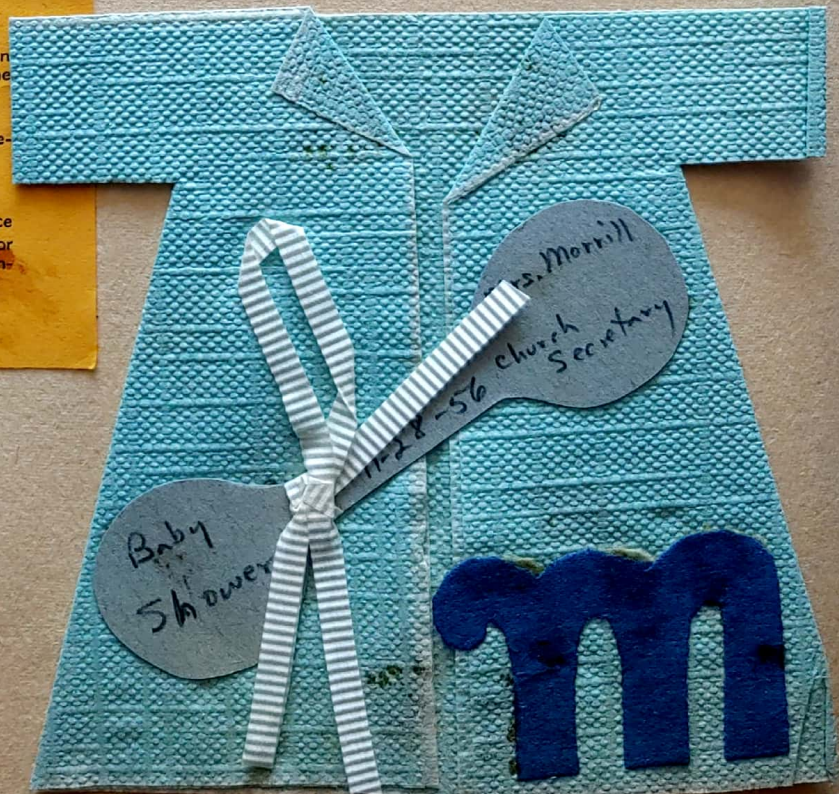

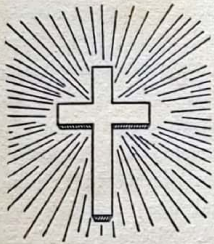

# Santa Shop Still Lacks \$1,665 To Clothe Needy Denver Tots

A lack of \$1,665 in donations to the Santa Claus shop Thursday threatened to deprive hundreds of needy Denver children of gifts of Christmas clothing.

Mrs. Milton Keegan, certificate chairman, said the lack of donations will force return to wholesalers of several hundred girl's dresses and 400 pairs of jeans which were placed in stock at the shop headquarters, 1650 Broadway.

There are about 7,500 gift cer-

tificates to be serviced by 1 p. m. Saturday, Mrs. Keegan said. But unless last-minute donations are received parents of underprivileged children will not be able to redeem the certificates for clothing.

Mrs. Frederic Adams, finance chairman for the shop, said this year's budget of \$11,650 was "about the same" as last year but more certificates were issued this year "and we've had a run on clothing."

Although the shop has enough toys, "unless we can make up the \$1,665 we'll be out of clothing before 1 p. m. Saturday when we close the shop," Mrs. Adams said.

The shop, established in 1930, issues certificates valued at \$1 for each underprivileged child. Parents use the certificates to purchase items at the shop, none of which is priced at more than \$1.

The 15,000 certificates issued will provide for the city's underprivileged, including 8,500 under welfare aid to dependent children, through Catholic Charities, the



Visiting Nurses Assn. and the Denver Housing authority.

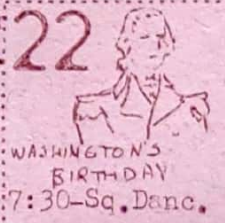

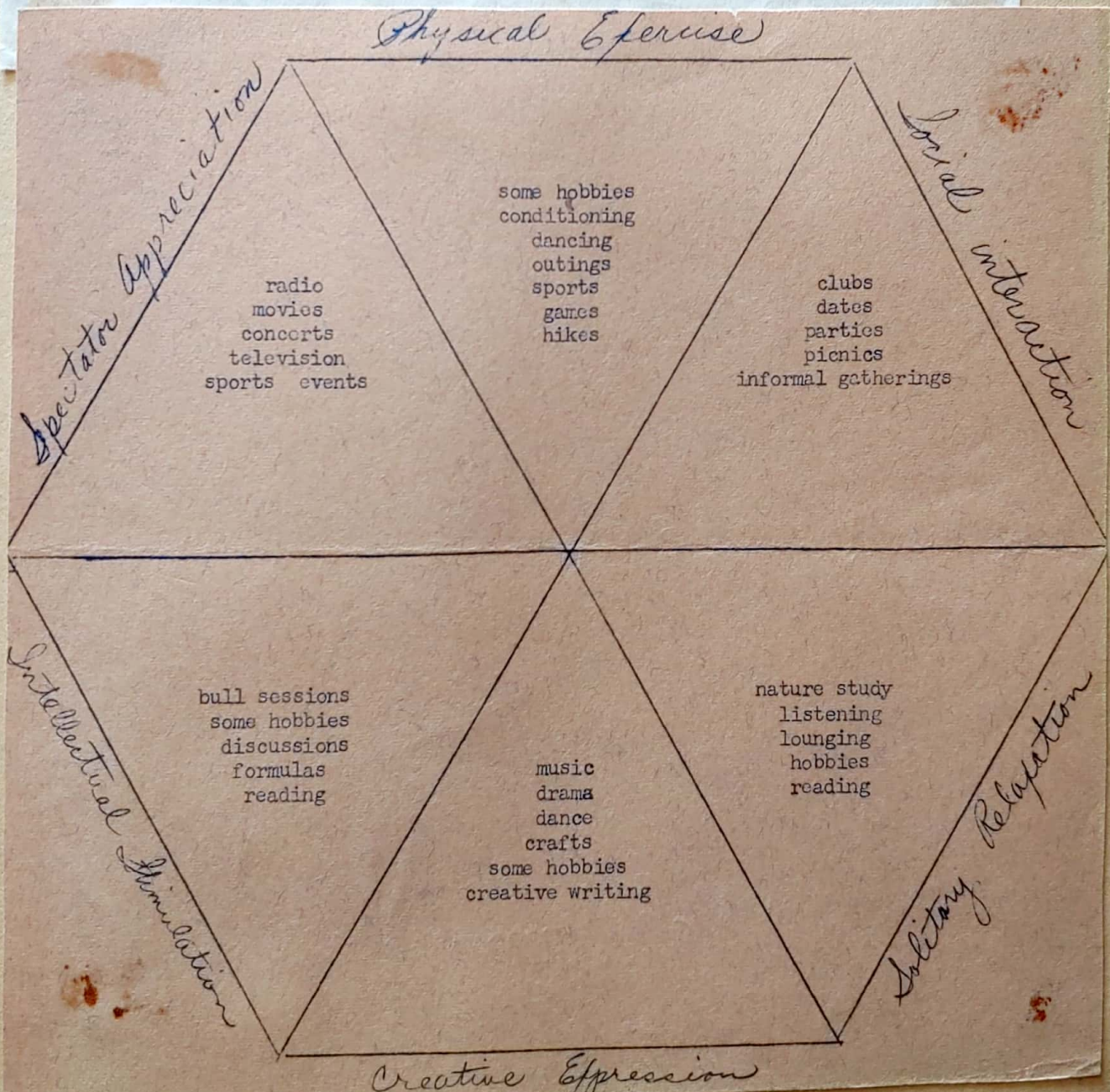

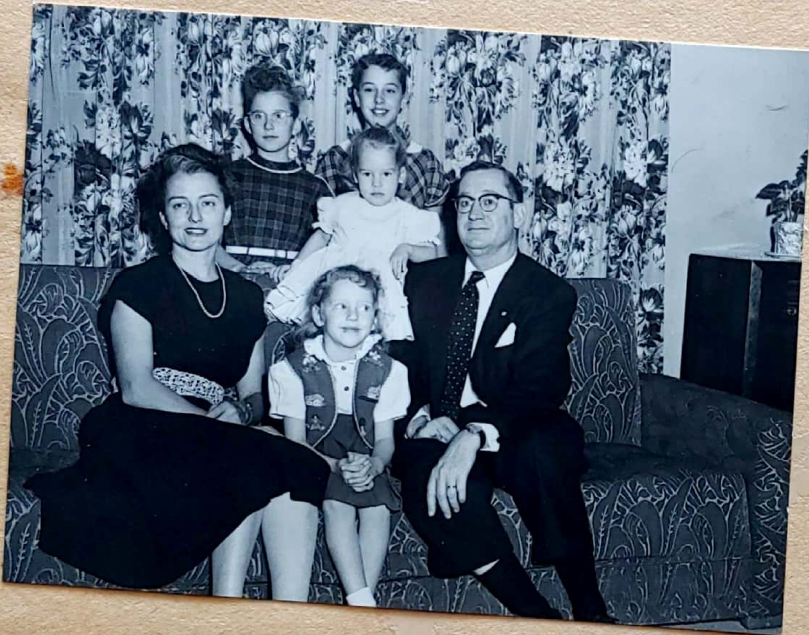

• How can a wedding ceremony be a truly sacred moment?

This question may not seem pertinent to the members of your group, since they have already been participants in wedding ceremonies. A second thought will show that this is an important question. Their children will in a short time be engaged and

### FOR CLASSES, GROUPS, OR INDIVIDUALS

• How can the service of joining the church be made a sacred moment?

Study "Our Child Joins the Church," by Ethlyne B. Staples. Discuss:

1. Children are prepared for church membership by early Christian training in the home, by teachers in Sunday school, by the pastor's class.
2. The major requirements to be filled upon becoming a church member are a belief in God as our heavenly Father, the acceptance of Jesus

ready for their wedding ceremonies. Furthermore, friends and relatives who contemplate marriage will feel the influence of interested persons who know what a sacred moment the ceremony can be. Also, a review of the vows taken at the ceremony and the circumstances governing it may do much to deepen and enrich a marriage.

First, the group may make a careful study of the ritual for matrimony found in the *Discipline* (¶1917) and in *The Methodist Hymnal* (page 546).

Discuss the following: (1) Matrimony instituted of God; (2) love and loyalty the foundation of a happy and enduring home; (3) keeping the sacred vows inviolate; (4) and endeavoring to do the will of God.

Discuss the promise made by both man and woman. Note the words: love, comfort, honor and keep, in sickness and in health; and forsaking all other keep thee only unto him [her], so long as ye both shall live.

Discuss the actual vows. Note the words: to have, to hold, from this day forward, for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part, according to God's holy ordinance.

Next study Dr. Albert Dale Hagler's article "Plan a Christian Wedding." Discuss:

1. The "quickie" wedding and its disadvantages. Why is it important that sufficient time be allowed for interviews with the minister?
2. The overplanning and overattention given to the fashionably correct ceremony.
3. Internal spiritual depth added to external beauty of setting in a wedding.
4. The first steps in planning a Christian wedding: Understanding what makes an attitude, an act, or a ceremony religious. Answer Dr. Hagler's question concerning a wedding you have witnessed recently. Does this music, wording, custom, meet the test of the basic characteristics of what is definitely religious?

Discuss:

1. Some "contemporary secular threats to a sacramentally conceived wedding ceremony conducted as a service of worship," the quickie wedding, the civil ceremony, home weddings.
2. Ways of making the wedding ceremony a spiritual experience—through prayer, allowing time for thorough consideration of the meaning of the wedding in the spiritual life of the couple, making schedules that will prevent needless worry.
3. Premarital conferences to discuss the meaning of marriage, etc.
4. Learning the church's rules concerning marriages, about music, flowers, photographers, etc. Avoiding use of a professional "consultant."
5. A complete physical and premarital examination.
6. Avoiding use of alcoholic beverages before

THEME: Christian Economics at Home

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- *What is a Christian view of work?*  
 "The Christian at Work," by Bonaro W. Overstreet, page 1, presents an excellent discussion of the subject of work. Consider the following:
  1. Work should be thought of as "one of the most satisfying and durable experiences open to man for the fulfillment of his human powers—and, thus, for self-fulfillment."
  2. The Christian goes beyond the concept of job to that of calling. He may choose work that brings less money or less prestige than another kind of work. He does not try to choose jobs for others.
  3. The Christian may take work that he would not choose and find significance in it. He will try to use his aptitudes in voluntary contributions.
  4. The Christian will try to prevent his work from becoming a "dead-end" job. He gets satisfaction from doing more and better work than is expected.
  5. The Christian guards against becoming biased, one-sided.
  6. The Christian works for the common welfare rather than for his own limited self-interest or the limited interest of his exclusive group. The Christian is for the "basic right of all human beings to have such opportunities as may enable them to use their best aptitudes in the service of man and God."
 Study "A Christian View of Vocations," by Hoover Rupert, page 18. Discuss:
  1. "That vocation is Christian which serves human need, is morally constructive, makes full use of one's talents, builds fellowship, enables one to work under a sense of God's call, and enriches personality."
  2. Every person is called to full-time Christian service in whatever vocation he elects or finds it necessary to maintain.
  3. Parents and children alike need to bring to the choosing of vocations the finest of Christian faith and nurture and the deepest of Christian concern and dedication.
 How does the consideration of the various points above apply to the vocation of housewife or homemaker? Consider this matter fully. Turn to Mrs. Overstreet's comments on "menial." If your work is homemaking, do you think of it as a creative, Christian vocation?
- *What is the Christian use of money?*  
 Study "Family Financing: the Christian Way," by Harold and Alma Sheridan, page 5, and "Some Ticklish Questions," by Edward D. Staples, page 14. Discuss the following ideas from the article by the Sheridans:
  1. Christian parents' ambitions and dreams for

STUDY GUIDE for PARENTS

- their families are based upon a true appreciation of things that are most worthwhile. Their choices are made, not to keep up with the Joneses, but to provide enriching experiences for the family.
2. Example of parents, early training, and participation in family discussions and plans can teach children the Christian use of money.
- Dr. Staples deals with some common problems Christian parents face. Discuss: (1) Differences in ways of handling monthly bills; (2) working out adjustments of who pays what, when there are two incomes; (3) differences of opinion concerning ways of earning money; (4) when income is "questionable"; (5) basic honesty in not taking advantage of others' mistakes; (6) the value of being honest in relation to others; (7) the high price of false pride; (8) how much to spend upon ourselves and how much upon others; (9) the Christian's obligation.
- *How can Christians adjust to curtailed incomes?*  
 "Let Strains Cement the Family," by Frances Dunlap Heron, page 11, provides some answers for this question. Discuss:
    - Financial strains should be faced with certain basic attitudes:
      1. When choices must be made we give preference to the enrichment of personality and intellect rather than to material comforts.
      2. The well-being of each member of the family is the concern of all.
      3. Faith and trust in God will guide us.
    - "You Can Live Cheaper," by B. Chambers, page 28, gives some good advice for living within an income. Discuss each way she suggests for living by her motto: "Watch the pennies, and the dollars will take care of themselves."
  - *How do children get the Christian view of work and use of money?*  
 "Stewardship of Money," by J. Stanford Smith, page 36, discusses experiences that help children "develop an understanding of financial stewardship and the brotherhood of man."  
 "Allowances for Young Children," by Sara E. Baldwin, page 17, "Records Show the Way," by Lucia Mallory, page 45, and "Do We Tempt Our Children to Steal?" by Valrie M. Geier, page 39, give help for specific problems.

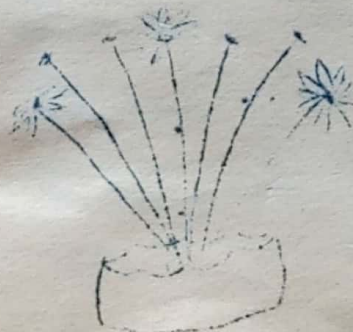

Report to the District Women's Work of Colorado - August 15, 1958, Rocky Ford, Colo.  
From the Women's Work at the Prince of Peace Church of the Brethren - Denver, Colo.

The Women's Work at the Prince of Peace Church, Denver is divided into two parts:  
The Aid Service group meets every Wednesday, all day at the church, with a carry-in lunch at noon. Their work consists of quilting, making comforters, mending relief clothing and preparing the weekly newsletter of the church for mailing. This year this group have quilted 7 quilts and have another one almost finished, they made 9 large comforters and 10 small ones and prepared several bags of relief clothing.

Our women are divided into four circles for a monthly night or afternoon meetings in the homes.
