#### A Few Facts.




Our ladies are very interested in Missions. One of our projects was to send \$15.00 to Dr. John Horning at our clinic in Quito, Equador, for medical supplies.

We have enjoyed our meetings this year and are looking forward to another fine year when our meetings resume in September.




The first Church of the Brethren to be built in Pueblo will be constructed at Hoffman and Azalea. First unit, which is pictured, is expected to cost
