
new—new bodies, new freedoms, new emotions, and often new friends. No wonder they are frequently confused.

"What does Christmas mean to you?" you might ask your group. You will get a variety of replies. To some it will mean work—shopping, cooking, company, big meals, entertaining. To others it will mean decorations, gifts, Santa Claus, and traditions. To the more religious it will mean the Christ child, pageants, church services, or reading the Christmas story in the home. A good listing of what Christmas may mean will be found in the Gateses' article on page 1.

To how many does Christmas mean preparation throughout the entire year? Is there a difference in the methods of celebrating Christmas in the homes of those who come from rural background and those who come from city homes? Not many people today can go out and select their own Christmas tree in the woods as the Gateses have done. Can there be just as much interest for the children in selecting a tree at the store? Discuss their statement, "Working, sharing together, laughing and singing, praying and reading—these make the warmth and the joy, the wonderful glow that only Christmas can bring."

Why do some people dread Christmas because once it brought them great happiness? Ask a member of the group to tell the story "Christmas for Elizabeth," page 4, of how a little girl brought two people a realization that Christmas does not die because a loved one is killed.

Anna Margaret Whitworth's story on page 45 tells about a minister's wife finding a new vision of the joys of sharing. This is another good story to have someone review for the group. Following this story you may want to ask the group to share their experiences that would indicate that "it is more blessed to give than to receive."



STUDY GUIDE for PARENTS

SUGGESTIONS FOR USE

The discussion for this month centers around four family crises-illness, the new baby, finances, and death. Members of the group will have experiences in these areas and others which they may be called upon to share. This study will be most practical if the discussion centers around the problems of the group instead of considering only the crises mentioned here. These are typical. Every family has some contact with them at some time or other. These articles should be practical springboards from which the group can get at the real problems of their members.

As you begin your preparation for this month's study, read rapidly through the articles listed under "Resources" below. How many of these should you below. How many of these should you assign to other members of the group for class reports? You might ask three members of the class or group to interview two persons each and ask them to name the most important problem he or she has had to meet during the last year. This would give you a practical list of problems against which to check the problems of members of the

You might begin your discussion with a report from these interviewers, listing the problems on the board, and adding others suggested by your own members. This is the kind of discussion which could have publicity value for your class. After your first session you might ask one member of your group to write a newspaper story about the problems you intend to discuss in the three weeks ahead. Other persons in the community will be interested in the fact that you are tackling these problems and a few new members may be attracted to your group because of interest in these subjects. It is always good to let the community know that the church groups are concerned about family problems

ILLNESS STRIKES US ALL

Most families have illness sometime or other. Some are very healthy, rarely have colds, and may go for years without any major sickness. Sooner or later, however, someone gets sick. How will you meet that problem? Or would you prefer to put off thinking about it until the time comes? Mrs. Cottrell in the first article in this issue suggests that illness is a normal part of the fabric of living. Discuss her statement, "Life must be built to include both happiness and trouble, sickness and health."

Ask the members of your group to tell how they have met the problem of sickness. How do you explain a serious illness to a young child without upsetting his sense of security?

Most of us pray when our loved ones are sick. Does a prayer like that on page 1, "And please, God, make my daddy well again," imply that God made daddy sick in the first place? How did the mother clarify the child's thinking about this?

Some persons try to prepare for emergencies by adding the words, "Thy will be done" or "If it be thy will." Discuss ways in which this may help a child, and the possibility of a child feeling that this illness might be the will of God for her father.

Does God ever send illness as a punishment for our sins?

Mrs. Cottrell's article emphasizes the importance of understanding as a background for the acceptance of illness, and the adoption of a positive program. Discuss the importance of the patient having a will to live. Is it just as important for others in the household to have a will to adjust and help? How can one give strength to others?

What are the values in reading the Bible during lness? What help can Christians expect to find illness? What help can Christians exp there? What passages would be helpful

Katherine Reeves's article on page 4 and Esther Middlewood's on page 11 point up the problems in the home when mental illness is discovered. Remind the class that in the April issue mental and emoonal health will be more fully covered. Lent has begun, and we are conscious that we are approaching the most sacred days in the life of the church. On Good Friday and Easter we observe the Crucifixion and Resurrection of our Lord, days that have had unusual significance in the lives of the followers of Jesus. This unit is broader than the observance of these days, although they include these important observances. The theme for this month is "The Christian Observance of Holy Days." HOLIDAY OR HOLY DAY?

These words come from the same root, a word meaning "whole," and may have originally referred to the spiritually whole person as holy. Today there is considered to the spiritually whole person as helidays and is considerable difference between our holidays and our holy days. Originally the holy day was a time of celebration, cessation from work, observed by both worship and play. In our more secular culture the emphasis has been placed on the recreational aspects of the days instead of on their religious significance.

Considerable emphasis has been made in recent years on "Keeping Christ in Christmas" and keeping

that day, which is essentially a religious day, from becoming only a holiday. There seems to be less danger of commercializing Easter, but our emphasis upon clothes, flowers, and greeting cards can detract from the spiritual joy that comes from contemplation of the religious significance of that day

As you approach this unit of study with your group, you might discuss such questions as:

1. What makes a holiday a holy day?

- 2. Discuss the significance of Mrs. Gebhard's statement: "But how often we return to the working day feeling flat and depressed rather than refreshed and inspired!"
- 3. What is the purpose of a holiday, of a holy day?
- 4. List the holidays we celebrate. What is the religious significance of each?
- 5. How many of our holidays have their origin in the Bible?
- 6. Can you think of Bible verses that are related to the significance of each holiday?

Read and consider the four suggestions given by Mrs. Gebhard at the close or her article, "Highlight the Holy Days," on page 14.

DO PROTESTANTS OBSERVE LENT?

A woman came over to her preacher who was eating at a neighboring table in the restaurant and said, "I am so glad to see that you are eating meat during Lent. My friend and I were having a discussion about the Protestant observance of Lent, when you came in and settled it for us. Now I can eat meat with a clear conscience."

The Roman Catholic Church has many fast days and days when they eat only certain foods. These customs grew up in earlier days when great value was placed upon self-denial and living the simple life. During the Reformation many churches turned away from these formal observances because they were Roman Catholic. Some Protestant groups do stress self-denial today, and many individuals give up candy, smoking, or drinking alcoholic beverages for Lent as a religious exercise. Often it is a denial that might be good for us all of the year, but it strengthens our self-respect to feel we have made the denial for even six weeks.

Discuss Dr. Bowen's statement, "The purpose of Lent was to allow the discipline of self-crucifixion to reign over life."

We Americans tend to neglect or gloss over anything that seems to be unpleasant, and for that reason have not placed much importance on the observance of Lent in our homes. Dr. Bowen tells us, "Any dread of this observance can be removed when it is dealt with in its positive aspects." What does he mean?

Protestants have missed some of the values of the Lenten season by not catching the spirit of self-

BEGINNING THIS STUDY

There are many resources in this magazine for this month's study, because almost every aspect of family living is related to mental health. Husband-wife relationships, parent-child understanding, the family's use of money, discipline, three generation family problems, worship, prayer, beliefs, and even physical health are all a part of good emotional and mental health. In this month's discussion, however, you will try not only to help the members of your group see that these problems are all related, you will try to help them understand those difficulties that do arise to disturb the mental and emotional life of people, and to accept them as illnesses.

While most of your study and preparation will be concerned with this magazine, you may wish to add local interest to this month's study by suggesting some of the following projects:

Visit a mental hospital and talk with some member of the staff. If it is not possible for the entire group to go, send a small committee that can report back to the group.

Check the county and state statistics on mental health. The fact that there seems to be an increase in the number of cases over a few years ago may not mean that so many people are mentally disturbed. It may reflect a larger population, or the fact that mental illness is more readily discovered and more naturally accepted than formerly.

Write to your state or county department of mental health for a list of the pamphlets and motion pictures available about mental health. Some states are very generous about sending materials in this area because they are eager to help their people understand the present situation.

Ask three members of the group to read the articles by Linzer, Klink, and Staples for reporting to the

WHY THIS PROBLEM?

It is only a few years ago that mental illness was considered incurable and institutions for the mentally ill were so poorly built and so inadequately staffed that there was little hope that one who entered such an institution would ever come out restored to health. Those who did show any signs of improvement were needed to care for the more violent and were rarely released. Their families frequently thought of them as dead. They tried to forget them.

Within twenty years this attitude has changed. The reasons for this change of attitude will be found in Dr. Linzer's article on page 1. You may wish to raise such problems as the following with your group:

What effect has the Mental Health Act of 1946 had upon the treatment of mental illness? What effect has it had on your county or state?

Why is your minister concerned about mental health? Dr. Klink, who wrote the article on page 5, has written a pamphlet entitled The Clergyman's Guide to Recognizing Serious Mental Illness* which has had wide distribution to ministers.

What are some of the ways in which the church can help with this problem?

Discuss Dr. Linzer's statement that "a child's early life experiences mirror much of what he will be like as an adult." Where, then, is a parent's responsibility for the future?

In your discussion, stress the positive side. What makes a mentally healthy individual?

How can we understand mental illness?

Remind the group that when we read a list like the

WHAT ARE WE SEEKING?

As a leader, you may wish to pause a minute and ask, "What do I want to happen in this meeting?" You may decide, "It's not what I want, but what should happen as a result of this study?" Some of you may decide that the main purpose is to bring information and you will lecture, or use charts or graphs, or word pictures to convey your ideas to the group. Others may decide that the most important thing that could happen to your group would be for them to do some thinking about peace of mind. How, then, can you best stimulate the thinking of the group?

Provocative questions may be the answer, whether you give the answers or let the group discuss the

Can you find peace of mind by trying out various religions, or in your own church? (See the Bach article.)

Relate the incident of the Indian. (See the Bach article.)

HOW FIND PEACE OF MIND?

The big question that the members of your group will be eager to get at will be "How do we get it?" When it comes up, face it frankly. You may get more discussion if you turn the answer back and ask, "How do you think it is attainable?" Those who have read this issue will certainly come back with the reply, "You cannot get it by seeking it." On the other hand you are not likely to achieve peace of mind without making some effort to understand the meaning of the term and the possibilities of finding it.

interpret these ideas in language children can stand, or is it because we have not answered these questions for ourselves? It may be there are some questions about the nature of God that we cannot answer. Persons have been engaged in the search for these answers for thousands of years. Theologians have disagreed about these questions. Why should parents be upset, then, because there does not seem to be a pat answer?

Help the group see that it is not the way we answer one question about God, but the total teaching of our children which is important. No two children are alike. Miss Goddard, in her article beginning on page 5, reminds us, "Once we understand and accept this we see religious growth as a slow process beginning in the lives of the parents before the child is born and continuing for the duration of life itself."

Ask one person to review the Goddard article, beginning on page 5, another person to review the Peterson article, beginning on page 11, and another person to review the Laymon article, beginning on page 24. Then raise such questions as: Where does God come from? Can we admit we

do not know?

income, the probability is that there are times when you feel "pinched."

Read Dr. Bowen's article beginning on page 2. Does this summarize the importance of money to our family life? Who determines whether we use money or allow money to use us? You may wish to return to Dr. Bowen's article at the close of the discussion on money to see whether or not you feel

the same way about it that you do now.

Read Paul's words quoted by Dr. Bowen from 1 Timothy 6: 6, 8-10. Ask the group, "Why is money the root of all evil?" They will mention that it is not the control of the lowest recovery which Paul cells the money but the love of money which Paul calls the root of all evils. Bring out this distinction. Don't we all love money? Is it a matter of putting first things

MONEY AND SECURITY

RESOURCES: Articles on pages 11, 22, 28, and 31. Is it wrong to want security for your family? Should everyone plan for a rainy day? At a later time we will discuss the values of saving, but how can parents best provide for the security of their children? Is money the only criterion? Does a large insurance policy enable a man to sleep better, knowing that his family will be provided for in case of his death? Money alone will not provide happiness, yet most of us want to make some provision for future emergencies.

PURPOSE OF AN ADULT DISCUSSION GROUP

Why do we bring parents together to discuss these materials in THE CHRISTIAN HOME?

Some would say that we have a parents class for fellowship and would offer as proof the fact that there are always more people present when the class has a party than are present on Sunday morning. Fellowship is important. Every session should provide a sense of belonging. Let no one feel like a stranger in your group.

Another purpose might be to help parents understand their children. Most parents feel the need for such understanding. Although we realize that perfect understanding may never be achieved, we know that the sharing of experiences, the discussion of the opinion of an authority, and the study of facts revealed by research on other children may help parents be better parents.

RELATIONSHIPS ARE IMPORTANT

Begin this unit by asking the group, "What does the word relationships mean to you?" To some it may mean family struggles, arguments, conflicts. Others will think of happy experiences together in the home. Dr. Reuel Howe in his article beginning on page 2, recognizes that family relationships "have a power to hurt as well as a power to heal."

One way to stimulate discussion in this session would be to ask four of the members of the group to role play a family situation, such as "Getting ready for church" or "Who's going to wash the dishes?" or "Henry won't let me play with him." dishes?" or "Henry won't let me play with him." Portray the way in which the parents handled the situation and then discuss the family relationships involved. Ask such questions as "Did the parents show understanding?" "Did they reveal their love for their child?" "What about the effect upon other children present?" Lead to a discussion of the basic problem "Why is love important in family relationships?"

Why does Dr. Howe think that it is necessary for a person to feel that he is loved? Is this any more important for children than for adults? What happens to home life when husband and wife no longer love each other?

Bring out the importance of people knowing that they are loved. Many parents who say they love their children do not seem to be able to communicate that love to their children or to each other. Ask the group to discuss Dr. Howe's statement "Love to us until we are able to love." As a child begins to love, what is our responsibility as parents? Ask for examples in which parents have misundersto. their children's attempts to

to display their Christmas stocks and the spirit of the holiday season fills the air. Whether it will be a holy season or not will depend upon the spirit of families. If yours is a Christian family, or even one striving to be Christian, the attention will focus upon the eternal values of the birthday of Christ.

The word Advent comes from a Latin word meaning coming. It refers to the days in which we anticipate the coming of Christ into the world. In the early Christian centuries the Advent season covered five weeks, but since the fifth century it has generally been observed in the church during the period beginning the fourth Sunday before Christmas. Because Christmas comes on Sunday this year, five full weeks are included. Other years Advent would be a shorter period. If any families in your group observe Advent with services in the home, they might be willing to help others begin this custom by giving suggestions and comments about their experiences.

This first session or possibly the second, if you have not had time to prepare for it, might be an hour in which the members of your group share family preparation for Christmas. Give the members a little warning so they can come prepared to share traditions, stories, favorite hymns, and recipes. Each person might be asked to write out a favorite recipe and make enough copies so each member of the class can have one. If your class is large, it might be simpler for each person to bring one copy and tell about it and have a committee mimeograph copies of all the recipes. This might be made in small booklet form with one on a page, or separate sections for cookies, candies, desserts, salads, and so forth.

There are some practical suggestions in the article by Mrs. Gates, page 2. Discuss her idea for getting the whole family together early to plan for the Christmas observances. She suggests that preparation and anticipation are half the fun.







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As you plan to lead the discussion, think about the persons in your group for a few minutes.

Are they parents of young children? If so, they will need to be alerted to the changes in educational methods which have taken place since they went to school. Some persons may not yet be concerned about the school system in your community or what has been happening in educational philosophy in recent years.

If your group is made up of parents of children who are already in school, they may have faced some of these problems before and will be full of questions.

If your group is made up of older parents, their concern may be for the "good old days." School to them is not like it used to be. Do not allow this discussion to degenerate into a gripe session, but help parents see the changes that are taking place, analyze the values, and draw up a plan of action if it is needed.

THEME: What Kind of Education for Our Children?

EDUCATION FOR WHAT?

One part of this discussion might well center around the purpose of education. Has the purpose changed? What is different? Begin this discussion by mentioning or discussing the ways in which the world has changed in this generation. Look at the five areas suggested by Rebecca Caudill in the first article. With these as background, she suggests four goals for education. Put these on the blackboard and discuss them one at a time, or ask one member of your group to give his views of each of these four points.

Lorenz Boyd suggests survival as a goal of education. What do you think about this? How does this fit into the Christian ideal, "Whoever would save

his life will lose it"?

Mrs. Vernon is a schoolteacher. She sums up the purposes of education in six points. Compare these with those mentioned above. She also stresses the importance of "tool" subjects. Does this seem to be in conflict with the position of Lorenz Boyd? How can we motivate children to want to read? How can we arouse curiosity? Is it not possible to kill interest in finding the answers to questions even before the child starts to school?

Why are some children so much more alert than others when they start their first year at school? These differences are not all heredity. Early attitudes toward learning are very important. If a child is taught at home not to ask questions, he soon gets the impression that the most satisfactory behavior is to be a soon that

Can children have too many interests, as Mrs. Vernon suggests? What are the values of these extracurricular activities? What are the disadvantages? How can we have a happy balance?

view; a moment of quiet; the first view of a new baby; tadpoles in a jar; the Grand Canyon; a plowed field; the creation of life; the sacrifice of grandparents; the wonder of growth; a crippled boy who whistled; the quiet of the sanctuary; the nesting birds; an appropriate worship service; a bird and a blossom; watching flowers and vegetables grow; studying fossils; the sunset.

Ask the members of your group to add other experiences that have caused a sense of wonder.

The article on page 12 suggests a different kind of wonder, the wonder of the existence of life. Why is it that at some times we feel so much

more alive and eager to live than at other times? How did the dream strengthen this woman's desire to live? Since this is an unusual experience, are there other ways through which we can attain

the sense of wonder at the glory of life?

Discuss the statement ". . . if we knew in every thread of our being what it meant to be alive, we would be giving every ounce of our knowledge and love to the business of creating life that is friendly to fellow life."

How can we help our children achieve this sense of the wonder of life? Can pets help? What about our attitude toward younger children in the family and community? How early can we teach this idea?

How can parents know when they are achieving a balance between the attitudes expressed in the two families described by Katherine Reeves near the end of her article?

CHILDREN HELP US WONDER

Mrs. Gebhard is a minister's busy wife, yet she finds time to explore and enjoy the wonders of nature with her children. In her article beginning on page 15 she relates how her three-year-old daughter called her attention to the glory of the sunset. She says that "the teachableness of spirit depends upon freshness of vision.'

Discuss with your group ways in which parents can be more alert to recognize the beauties of life.

You might ask members of your group to consider ways parents often kill the wonder in a child's mind by being too busy to look or listen. What should be the relationship between scientific explanations of events and seeing the wonder of creation?

Will it not be difficult to help children see the divine will back of creation unless we make a definite effort to become aware of it ourselves? It is so easy to miss the purpose in life and beauty. Mrs. Gebhard brings out the importance of discovering the wonders of creation together. We don't find all of the answers. "For every question the test tube, the microscope
